Manager's Report

Gate and Code Enforcement Hours

With the uncertainty of how much rain we will get before this summer, we are not sure what staffing will be necessary at the gate, and exactly what the gate hours will be. At this point we are not planning to keep the gate open 24 hours. We advise you to check our website regarding our hours of operation.

Sticker update

It is 2015 and time to update the stickers on your vehicles and watercrafts. Please stop by the gate and have the staff do this update.

Mussel Inspection

It is your responsibility to ensure that your watercrafts and your guest's watercrafts are inspected and that your owner's stickers are updated, PRIOR to launching. If they/you fail to obtain an inspection you could be subject to a \$500 citation.

Volunteers needed for summer 2015 to monitor launch ramps

Last summer we had boats that launched without being inspected. The owners claimed that their boats had not left the community, but our program has a zero tolerance for boats launching without an inspection. This carries a \$500 fine. We need volunteers to be at the two launch ramps to insure that boats have been inspected prior to launching. This requires only a few hours a day for the first couple weeks of the summer. Please consider volunteering to help save your lake.

Weed Abatement

Each year by June 10th all owners' properties are to be abated of all weeds and flammable debris. This is a County and Association requirement and helps in reducing the fire potential in the community. Failing to complete this by June 10th will result in a very expensive fine. So to avoid the fine, please get the work done by June 10th

Community Chipping Program

We will conduct a community brush chipping program the week of May 26-29 and September 8-11.

Staff Projects

The maintenance staff has been working with a group of volunteers on the planning and execution of a complete upgrade of the front enterance to the community. This project involves renovating all the landscaping in the area that included removing what is currently planted in this area and installing new mature trees and plants. We are hoping to get the majority of this work done by Memorial Weekend.

ARC

Too many owners are forgetting to obtain ARC approval prior to starting any and all work on the exterior of their homes. It is very important that this process be followed; if you fail to follow the ARC guidelines please expect the following:

A \$50 citation for a CC&R violation and your contractor or workers will not be allowed to enter the community

All of these will only delay your project. The ARC process is simple and easy to get done.







The right turn not taken, could mean missed opportunities, or worse, a winery never discovered. For years after make the turn onto San Marcos Rd, there are two winery signs, one pointing straight, and the other to the right. On a Sunday a month ago I went right not knowing the name of the winery or how far down the road it could be. But with anticipation and discovery potential, I traveled. Finally quite at the end of the road, there it was, a gate plus a name posting. Domaine Degher, Mojocellars. The call box says, call this number. I asked are you open for tasting, the

voice asked, are you at the gate? Give me ten minutes and then come on up. It happened. Greeting us at the house was Denis Degher, owner/winemaker and recording artist, Sleepy Guitar Johnson. What a view at the top and a beautiful property. Denis said that we would taste on his private veranda and he needed a few minutes to organize.

This turned out to be one of my top ten best wine tastings ever. Denis sat and conversed with us about the wine, his vision, the quality control, and all the while listening to his guitar blues jam. For an hour and half we were in wine nirvana. Taking the time to experience and evaluate each of the wines offered. Often times, expectations are less than expected. In each varietal tasted they far exceeded them all. Denis was just as excited to have us there and his personality brimmed with pride as he poured for us. Denis is an accomplished studio-recording artist and his wall of Gold Records proves it. I did not want this to end. The next best thing was to download the album and buy the wine for my own 'veranda' tasting. With only 400 cases produced annually, and estate grown, one does not hesitate.

Let me take you through the Mojo series of blends and my impressions of each.

2008 Mojo Bordeaux blend of 67% Cabernet and 33% Syrah. The aging of this blend has added intensity that struck a huge chord for me. The texture and feel of the wine was gripping in the mouth. The flavors unfold very fast and fruity. The robust plums, cherries, and hints of sweet fig are very pleasing to the palate. The finish evolves slowly and smoothly allowing one to savor the experience. Very limited cases, priced at \$42 per, for this quality is far less than some price lesser quality wines. I rate this Mojo blend at 9.4 corks out of ten.

The 2006 Library Mojo can take you to the higher notes. It is a San Fran Chronicle winner in 2010 and Central Coast medal winner 2011. It is a medal winner with me. It is a blend of 51% Syrah and 49% Cabernet. This will keep you in suspense to which varietal shines through. This is a much bigger, darker, thicker wine to chew on. The nose releases some green tobacco and soft cocoa. (Continued on Next Page)

The finish can last for 30-40 seconds that puts a smile on your face. Priced at \$52 per for 2006 out of the library is a definite checkout. 9.5 corks of ten. Now to my high point and vibrato of the offerings. The 2009 Cabernet Sauvignon and San Fran Chronicle Gold medal winner 2012. This Cab can hang in the orchestra and still standout. The color is the darkest of the three enticing you to stare for meaning. The first sip denotes the supreme richness of the cab fruit and the quality and care of this estate fruit. You swirl it in your mouth slowly before swallowing while enjoying this near perfect balance of aging. The finish holds all the notes letting it play music of Sleepy Guitar Johnson. Now hold your pics on the price...\$42 per. I feel like I'm stealing! If you wish to experience a special Cab, you cannot wait. 9.7 corks out of 10.

Are you ready for wine, music, and quality all from one person, Denis Degher? Then I encourage you to go to mojocellars.com and make arrangements.



Our Dear Deer — Part 1 By Ginny Becchine



The Columbian black-tailed deer is the most numerous deer in California and the most prominent found in San Luis Obispo County. The Columbian black-tailed range from southern British Columbia roughly to Santa Barbara, and as far east as the Cascade and Southern Sierra Nevada Mountains. In California some deer herds are migratory and others, like the herd in Oak Shores, are yearlong residents. The home range is very small maybe less than a mile and the deer may spend their entire



lives in this small area.

The Columbian black-tailed deer is one of the six subspecies of mule deer found in California. Mule deer vary in size depending upon region. The largest occur in the Rocky Mountains and the smallest is the black-tailed deer. Mule deer in general are larger than White-tailed deer, but our black-tailed is actually smaller. Adult black-tailed bucks weigh 140 to 200 pounds and an adult does weigh 90 to 130 pounds. Mule deer have much bigger ear than white-tailed deer and it is those ears that gave them their common name. Their ears move independently of each other like miniature satellite dishes.

The easiest way to differentiate white-tailed deer from mule dear is to look at the tail. White-tail deer have a large tail that is dark on the top but pure white underneath. When alarmed they raise the tail upright showing the bushy white underside. The tail is like a flag signaling the alarm. Contrast that with our mule deer's small tail that hangs down like a short piece of rope. The amount of white and black in a mule deer's tail varies with subspecies. The tails of some subspecies are mostly white with just a black tip. Our black-tailed deer's tail is almost solid black on top and white underneath. Also, mule deer do not flash their tails in alarm like the white-tails do. Oddly enough the white-tailed deer lacks the large, conspicuous white rump patch that mule deer have.

White-tailed deer and mule deer move differently when alarmed. The mule deer moves in a series of stiff-legged jumps with all four feet leaving and hitting the ground simultaneously. This is call stotting. A mule deer may jump as high as two feet and as far as 15 feet. They have been known to clear eight-



foot fences. When alarmed the white-tailed deer bounds off with all the grace attributed to this species and they are faster than mule deer. The white-tail's key to escaping a predator is speed. But stotting offers two advantages: it allows the deer to out-distance predators in rough terrain, and to see above the thick brush. Mule deer can bound over boulders and stumps that the predator must run around and if necessary, they can turn or completely reverse direction in the course of a single bound.

Mule deer are active primarily in mornings, evenings and moonlit nights. In a hot environment this allows them to conserve water and keep their body temperature within livable limits. Sweat glands and panting also provide evaporative cooling during hot periods. (Continued on Page 9)



Entrance Landscape & Lighting Project

The Oak Shores Board of Directors had a planning workshop in January to establish priorities for 2015. One of the priorities agreed upon was the completion of the landscape & lighting project for the Oak Shores entrance area. The project also includes the repair and renovation of the two landscape ponds and the exterior of the small office on the right as you enter Oak Shores. This is the first view our owners, family members and guests see when they come to Oak Shores. The project is well underway with a completion goal by June 30. The project will add to the existing beautiful entrance gate kiosk and the new entry sign.

You may have noticed that the entrance area has been cleared and cleaned up as a first step. The dead and chopped up trees have been removed, the junipers hiding the ponds have been removed, the weeds, miscellaneous ground covers and dead bushes have been removed and the ponds are in the process of repair and restoration.

It is all of our good fortune that one of our volunteer workgroup members, Mark McMullen, owns a large landscape design and installation company in the Valencia/Saugus area of Los Angeles. He has brought his knowledge, skills, 30 years of experience and even wholesale vendors to the subcommittee working on this project. After much discussion and analysis of the site, he expanded on the plan first developed by John Watkins. Mark prepared a professional landscape/lighting plan for the entire area. It includes tree and plant selection and placement, irrigation requirements and layout, pond restoration and cost estimates. He also volunteered to secure wholesale prices from his plant nursery vendors. We are so fortunate to have his expertise and participation in this important beautification project.

Part of the plan will be the identification and assignment of installation tasks. Our Maintenance Staff and volunteers will do the work, saving labor costs. We will have Mark's guidance and supervision to ensure the installation is done properly and the new plants, irrigation lines and low voltage landscape lighting are protected from the animals. The design plan and cost estimates have been approved by the Architectural Review Committee and Board of Directors. With staff and volunteer labor, Mark's discounts, a financial contribution by the Recreation Committee and the fundraising initiative described below, the cost to OSCA budget will be very little. In fact, the cost may be entirely offset if all the new boxed trees are sponsored.

The fundraising idea approved by the Board of Directors that will reduce or eliminate the cost to OSCA is to allow members to sponsor a new tree, bench or other appropriate landscape amenity with a name plaque recognizing the contributor. See the information box on Page 5 for more details. If you would be willing to assist as a volunteer with the planting and installation, call the office with your name. It will be fun and exciting to see this beautification project come to life and enhance our wonderful community.

A mule deer's sense of smell is up to 1,000 times stronger than a human's. Research suggests that a mule deer can detect human odor at up to a half mile away. They can detect water that is up to two feet below ground and can then use their large feet to claw out the water. Their eyes are located on the sides of their heads giving them a 310-degree view around themselves. They have better nighttime

vision than humans, but less accurate daytime and color vision. Mule deer can detect slight predator movement up to 600 meters away, but they are not very good at detecting motionless forms.

Mule deer are primarily browsers. Horses and cattle are grazers and eat mostly grasses. While browsers and grazers will occasional eat each other's food; they usually have different types of teeth to help them bite and chew the foods they eat most often. The diet of the mule deer varies greatly depending on the season, geographic region, and elevation. In all seasons their primary food is leaves and twigs of woody shrubs, this is especially true in winter. A part of the mule deer's diet is flowering plants, especially in spring and early sum-



mer, and they are known to eat some 788 species of plants. Acorns are important food for deer in late summer, fall and early winter.

FUN FACTS

- A cooperative association occurs between deer and scrub jays. Scrub jays pick ticks and perhaps other parasites from the skin of deer.
- Our black-tail deer are excellent swimmers but do not usually use water as a means of escaping predators.
- Mule deer usually live 9-11 years in the wild and can live to be much older when in captivity.



Firewise Committee Update

The Fire Wise Committee plans to sponsor a fundraising BBQ on the Sunday of Memorial Weekend, May 24, 2015 starting at 5:00pm. The funds raised will be used to continue raising community fire prevention awareness. We would appreciate the help of more volunteers. If you are available, please call Joe or Joan Howard at 805 472-2858. We look forward to a successful event!

On January 22, 2015, I attended the Fire Safe Council meeting held in San Luis Obispo. The Fire Safe Council consists of members who represent business, education, political districts and Fire Organizations. It



was informative to see how grant money is allocated for the purpose of reducing fire danger within San Luis Obispo County. During the meeting, it was mentioned several times that Oak Shores is the first Fire Wise Community in the county, a distinction in which we can take pride. It is unlikely that Oak Shores will receive significant grant money this year since approximately forty (40%) percent of the Monterey Pine trees in the Cambria area have recently died and are currently the first priority for the County.

Last September the Fire Wise Committee agreed to produce a survey to measure community support for staffing a new fire station. That survey has been written and delivered to the Oak Shores Board of Directors. It has been sent to all property owners in addition to registered voters in our fire district. The results of the survey have been counted and the results reported to the Board at the January 2015 meeting and perhaps will help determine in what direction to proceed. There were approximately 750 surveys mailed with 250 replies. The results are as follows:

- 1. How important is it for you and your family to have a full-time staffed fire station in Oak Shores? Extremely Important (27) Important (56) Slightly Important (65) Not important (103)
- 2. How much if any are you willing to pay per year for a full time fire station in Oak Shores? Zero (129) \$200 (37) \$400 (37) \$600 (17) \$800 (30)
- 3. Would you support an assessment if there were a Sunset Clause? (end date) Yes (80) No (161)
