First, I would like to announce that at the April meeting, our General Manager Annette Louder gave us her resignation. She has decided to relocate to Southern California to be closer to her and her husband's families.

We have been very busy reviewing over 40 applications and recently interviewed the top few candidates for this position. During this period the board has appointed Stephanie Dayton as Interim Manager until the General Manager's position is filled. Stephanie is doing a great job and her efforts are very much appreciated by all.

Recently we held a second interview with candidate Dennis Javens, he has accepted the position and will report to work sometime in July, giving him time to leave his current position in Irvine, California. He will be relocating to his new home in Atascadero with his wife. We look forward to having Dennis as our General Manager, please stop by the office and introduce yourself when you have the chance.

In May, I was appointed Board President. Bob Lever has been very busy and needed to be away for a few months. The board also appointed Jim Money to take the position as Vice President. Don Reader has decided to leave the board since his business needs him and requires a lot more of his time in Salinas. We currently are hoping to have filled Don's position by the time you receive this newsletter. I have until September to serve on this Board, my term of four years will have been completed and I can not run again due to term limits. I would hope and encourage you to be involved for your community and please consider running for the board if you are interested. There will be 4 openings on the Board this year and elections will be held in September.

The lake has been continuously dropping. As of June 17 the lake was at 30% with the elevation at 738 feet, the water was at the 90 foot mark on the main ramp. The Monterey County Water Resources Agency reported release schedule has the lake level on July 1 at 736 feet of elevation and as of August 1 at 725 feet of elevation. Our main ramp will have to be closed at the 728 foot elevation. Based on this report we will have to close the main ramp about the third week of July. So, if you plan on using the lake, now is the time. We do have a single wide auxiliary ramp that can be used for a short period of time. The last time we had to use this ramp was in 1994.

The attorney representing Oak Shores in the suit filed by Watts/Burlison has advised the Board that he will attend the August Board meeting. He will address the members present at this meeting and answer any questions that each of you might have.

#### Interim General Manager's Report

I would like to begin by wishing everyone a fantastic second 1/2 of 2009!

As Randy expressed in his *President's Report*, we are in the midst of a huge transitional period. I would like to express my sincere gratitude to the Board, the entire Staff, and the whole Community for the outpour of support through this transitional time.

As hectic as it has been, the overall operations of Oak Shores have been running very smoothly, and things seem to be really looking up for Oak Shores.

The Maintenance Department has completed the abatement of the weeds from all of the common areas; and by the time you read this, the weed abatement deadline for all private lots to be cut will have come and passed. The Maintenance Department will have cut the lots that were not cut; and unfortunately, those owners that did not abate their weeds will have been fined and charged to have their lots cut by the Maintenance crew.

Aside from their daily tasks, the Maintenance crew has been working to clean up and beautify the gate entrance area, the golf course, the maintenance yard, and the clubhouse and marina areas. The Maintenance crew has been working closely with the Beautification Committee to ensure that the goals of the Committee are being implemented.

Long-time resident of Oak Shores, Aaron Dick, has been hired to assist Mike, Dale, and J.J in Maintenance, in Guy "Duke" Snow's absence. We are confident that he will be a great asset to the Department. Please welcome him if you see him working throughout the Community.

The Code Enforcement and Gate Staff have entered into their busiest time of the year. We made it through the Memorial weekend and it is all downhill from here.

Five Cities Security Inc. has been contracted to assist Code Enforcement on the weekends throughout the Summer. The gate is now open 24/7 during the Summer to help monitor the people coming into the Community. The Gate Staff is now the key contact for Code Enforcement. Please always contact the gate if you feel unsafe, or have even the smallest of Code Enforcement issues, and the Gate Staff will promptly contact Code Enforcement.

We have hired four seasonal Code Enforcement and Gate Attendants to assist for the Summer; I would like to welcome to the Community, Jeff Armbruster, Deborah Fitzpatrick, Louis Estrada, and Liz Lawrence. The hard work and dedication of the entire Code Enforcement and Gate Staff is greatly valued.

At the beginning of June, our office billed all property owners for the second half 2009 assessments. If you have chosen to pay with one of the Payment plans that the Association offers, you will find, along with that mailing, we sent a *Payment Agreement* which we are now requiring be filled out and returned to our office. This is an effort to ensure timely payments from owners on payment agreements and to inform owners of the repercussions if their payment is not received by the office in a timely manner.

The Association too is feeling the results of the bad economy; nevertheless, I can assure you that we are doing everything that we can to control expenses and protect the Community.

#### Meet Your Neighbors – Alex and Cindy Ferrel

When you enter Oak Shores, have you noticed the newly-painted gate kiosk and office, or did you happen to recently attend our Memorial Day Golf Tournament and see the winner's plaques? If you have, our Oak Shores part-time resident and full-time painter, Alex Ferrel, sponsored the plaques and generously donated his time and the paint to help out the Beautification Committee with the gatehouse project. These are only a few of the many Oak Shores events that Alex has offered his help with over the years. Last year he volunteered to paint the pool shade cover and green pillars on the clubhouse. He loves Oak Shores!

Alex started coming up to Oak Shores in the 70's while in high school to visit friends from Santa Maria, Linn and Marjorie Lutz and their daughter, Ann. He'd get up early to help them build the foundation for their house, and they'd take him out water skiing in the afternoon. Throughout the years, he became familiar with some of the surrounding communities of the lake. He won a bid at an auction for a one-week vacation house at Running Deer, and also visited friends at Heritage Ranch. Alex and his wife, Cindy, decided that Oak Shores would be the best place for their family. They purchased a lot on Crow's Nest Loop in 2002; then bought their house on Captain's Walk in 2005. Alex and Cindy worked as a team to make this happen and consider it a great accomplishment.

Cindy and Alex met at a birthday party in 1979, started dating the following year and have been married for 24 years. They have two children. Their son, Trevor, 22 years old, works as a painter; their daughter, Stacia, who is 19 years old, attends Hancock Community College in Santa Maria. They also have a papion dog, Angel. They live full time in Orcutt, just outside of Santa Maria, where they have been very involved with their children's activities and their community. The entire family was involved in the Los Amiges 4H Club and Righetti FFA up until the kids turned 19 years old. 
Alex enjoys his profession for many reasons. Number one is that it provides for his family. He performs his painting jobs with his entire body, mind and soul. He is a physical person and views his work as exercise. When he's painting, he gets to think about creative ideas. He likes turning nothing into something. He enjoys meeting with homeowners to review the details of what they want done, and he strives to ensure they are happy with his work. That brings him joy. He has painted numerous houses at Oak Shores, along with help from his son and nephew, and is grateful for these opportunities.

Alex describes himself as a visionary and a "Let's Do The Job" type of person. He has very strong values which he learned from his grandfather, Pedro Senior, who was the superintendent at the Oceanic and Klau mines. Alex has a vivid image of his granddad working so hard and watching the sweat pour off his face. His father, Pedro, was born at the Oceanic Mine just outside Morro Bay. In 1930, they left to mine in Jamestown, Ca. and in the late 1930's came back to work the Klau mine in Adelaide. His grandfather then bought a mine in the Cachuma Lake area and then another mine east of Santa Maria.

He sees the positive in everything in life. #### **Dan in the Vines** By Dan Del Campo



Many of us will never set foot in Tuscany to experience the countryside much less the world renown wines that come from this region in Italy. Fortunately, Segundo Blasti immigrated to the USA and of all places, Rancho Cucamonga. This area was once one of the largest grape growing regions in California. No more.

The Sarzotti's now reside in our "Tuscan" countryside and have gone from farmers to vintners. They grow varietals on ten acres that make up the bulk of their estate wines. My first visit to Sarzotti in Templeton made me a believer in their winery, not to mention that I felt like I had just found long lost family. My most recent visit was the same in their motto, "Savor the passion, drink to life". This is what drives the family to create

their handcrafted wines. Handcrafted can sometimes be an overused word, but not in this case. Jim will be the first to inform you that no one but family touches the wine including the vineyard. They truly are hands on. This is reflected in the quality of the wines and the pride they have when pouring a taste. And taste you must. Production is just at 1,000 cases; which means if you taste, you like, you buy, or you miss out.

High on my list was the 2006 Barrel Reserve Cabernet. This cab was very robust in fruit flavor but had easiness to it that left a smooth linger for drinkability with hearty osso buco or pesto pasta rich in garlic. This is a result of the wine aging in French Oak for 30 months. This is a labor-intensive aging process that creates stability in the wine allowing for some additional aging. The surprise, of course, is, where can you get this level of quality for \$26! Other releases include Cabernet, Merlot, Syrah, Late Harvest Merlot, Dolce Amore and Vino Bianco. The Bianco has a mystery, because they lost track of the vineyard origins. No worries, it is crisp and delightful.

The Dolce Amore is a pleasure wine. Dolce Amore means sweet love, and naturally it was made with Zinfandel grapes. This wine is in a style you might find served at a trattoria in Tuscany with cheeses after dinner. It's not a desert wine because that would be an injustice on how it should be enjoyed. One must sit and sip it with cheese-based deserts made from ricotta or mascarpone. Add in friends and family for a setting in any Italian Villa.

For your next wine tasting outing, drive out to the "Family Sarzotti" and have a Tuscan experience right in your own backyard. There will be no strangers when you leave because you become part of the family. Isn't that the way it should be? And finally, Jim says that father Segundo Blasti would be proud.

In the spring, at a board meeting, the subject of a beautification committee was brought up in conversation, and that was the beginning of our community "Beautification Committee". This committee's purpose is to observe our community, suggest improvements, develop an idea for approval, secure the funding and implement those ideas that the committee, and board of directors, feel will improve our overall appearance. #### The Birds Around Us **By Ginny Becchine**



"I saw a man. He danced with his wife. In Chicago, Chicago, my hometown".

Chicago isn't my hometown, and you will have to read the entire article to find out the significance of that song. Actually, I'm from New Jersey so I didn't see a Callipepla Californica until I moved to California. I was a Respiratory Therapy student doing a clinical rotation at Stanford Hospital, and as I was leaving the hospital grounds, I saw them running across the road. Today, I



doubt you could find these birds anywhere in Silicon Valley. I find it especially sad because this is our state bird; but habitat destruction and feral cats have caused their population to decline.

I'm talking about the cute and plump California Quail. Adult males are rich gray and brown, with a black face outlined with bold white stripes. Females are a plainer brown and lack the distinctive facial markings. Both sexes have a cute teardrop-shaped topknot of feathers projecting forward from their forehead. The male's topknot is longer and more elegant, but it must drive him crazy as it bobs up and down right before his eyes.

When alarmed, quail prefer to run. They only fly as a last resort. Quails have short very broad wings that are built for fast takeoffs, dodging quickly between obstructions and short flights. Startled quail take off with an explosive start. They stay low to the ground and disappear into the brush. Don't expect to see quail flying high overhead.

California Quail are mainly seedeaters. During the nonbreeding season, California Quail form coveys (groups) of about 30 to 70 individuals. At the start of breeding season, the covey breaks up and pair bonds form. Females build their well-hidden nests on the ground under a bush or a brush pile and lay about 12 to 16 eggs. After 22-23 days the chicks hatch



out. The chicks are covered in brownish down, have good vision, can walk, follow their parents, and peck at the ground immediately after hatching.



Baby birds come in two varieties, precocial or altricial. Precocial refers to species in which the young are relatively mature and mobile from the moment of birth or hatching. Quail young are precocial, as are chickens, many species of ducks and geese. Altricial young are hatched with eyes close and little or no downy feathers. They are incapable of leaving the nest and are fed by the parents (ex. - finches, bluebirds, robins, jays, etc.) Other examples of altricial young are eagles and hummingbirds. Can you imagine the size of naked baby hummingbird? Well they are almost microscopic. I have held and fed baby hummingbirds, what a joy. Here is the post test. Are baby humans precocial or altricial?

The main call of the California Quail consists of three syllables and sounds like the bird is saying Chi-ca-go. The call is usually given when an individual is separated from its group or mate, as well as while a covey is on the move or preparing to move. The call lasts about 1 second and can be given 10 times or more in succession. Listen, you will hear it all over Oak Shores.

#### **Recycling Begins—New Trash Cans To Arrive Soon**

The State of California required cities and counties to divert 50% of the waste stream out of the landfills by 2000. The standards have been expanded and increased, and now all Community Service Districts and private communities like Oak Shores must begin participating in an approved recycling program. Therefore, San Miguel Garbage Company will initiate a new automated trash can service about August 1st at Oak Shores including recycling. Each customer will receive:

One 64-gallon trash receptacle (provided by SMG) One 64-gallon recycling receptacle (provided by SMG)

The current monthly rate is \$21.50 for four 35-gallon cans provided by customer. Any old cans a customer no longer wants can be removed and recycled at no additional cost. The new rate will be \$23.25 for these two 64-gal trash and recycling receptacles. The trash rates are approved by the County, and in most other areas of San Luis Obispo County they exceed \$40 per month. OSCA has a reduced rate because it is recognized as a recreational community with many part-time residents, and OSCA does all the trash billing.

In addition, San Miguel Garbage will continue to provide 7 three-yard trash bins year-round for residents excess trash. They are located at the Maintenance Yard (they are at capacity every week at no additional cost to Oak Shores).

The County Public Health Department requires that all residents utilize the garbage service to avoid illegal dumping and protect the public health. The only exception is for homeowners who take their trash to a local landfill themselves and submit a weekly dump ticket as evidence of compliance.

#### Season's Eatings By Chef Cindy Peyton

Juicy berries, sweet corn, flavorful tomatoes. Nothing says summer more than the abundant variety of produce available now. Farmer's markets, roadside stands and, yes, the local supermarkets are brimming with nature's exuberance.

But many of us will still shy away from a platter of steamed or sautéed colorful summer vegetables. Or pass up a bowl of strawberries for a chocolate chip cookie. So I'd like to share two recipes guaranteed to enhance your summer pickings. Pair the aioli with steamed or fresh vegetables and the Greek yogurt with fresh fruit, and you'll put smiles on your friends' and family's faces.

#### **GARLIC AIOLI**

- -1 large, very fresh egg yolk
- -1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- -2 teaspoons fresh lemon juice, or more to taste
- -3/4 cup canola oil
- -2 to 4 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil
- -3 or 4 garlic cloves, minced very fine
- -Salt and fresh ground white pepper to taste

Set a very clean 1 quart sized stainless steel or glass bowl on the counter. Wrap a wet towel around the base of the bowl to hold it still. Place the egg yolk in the bowl and whisk it vigorously. Add in the mustard, lemon juice, and a small pinch of salt. Whisk again. SLOWLY begin to drizzle in the canola oil, drop by drop, while constantly whisking. As an emulsion forms, the oil can be added a little faster. Add the extra virgin olive oil at the end, adding to taste. Add in the minced garlic. Season to taste with salt, white pepper and lemon juice.

#### HONEYED GREEK YOGURT

-1 cup full fat Greek yogurt

-2 tablespoons honey

Whisk the Greek yogurt with the honey. Pour into a bowl and set on a platter. Surround the yogurt bowl with strawberries, cherries, figs or stone fruit. Serve toasted pistachios or walnuts on the side. A WORD ABOUT ZUCCHINI

We steam it, sauté it, bake it and grill it. But unless it's deep fried and served with a side of ranch dressing, I didn't understand the appeal. It was bitter tasting and had an unappealing watery texture. That's because, according to a grower at the farmer's market, my supermarket zucchini was a good two weeks old. So if you avoid the limp slices of zucchini on your plate, buy fresh and taste the mild, sweet flavor of this versatile vegetable.

#### Three is Not a Crowd by Brent Frank



Have you ever woke up to a beautiful sunny summer morning, the lake was glass, you had a boat full of gas, but no one to go skiing or wakeboarding with you? So what do we do when these times happen upon us? We call our friends and family and beg them to go out and drive or flag for us.

How to be a Third and get invited again and again.

Many good wake boarders do not own a boat, they count on getting invited out by others who do own boats. They have adopted all the little rules and duties that are important to that boat owner. I'm going to point out a few common

chores and duties that are important to all boat owners. If these simple tasks are followed I think you will get invited out to enjoy a nice ski or wakeboard session on a regular basis:

#### Things to bring

• <u>Boat gas</u>: Offer to pitch in on gas. If you own a pick up truck, make an attempt to bring boat gas, major brownie points.....

• <u>Sunscreen</u>: Sounds trivial; but if you knew how much sunscreen a boat owner buys, you would be shocked. The stuff is expensive, and a boat full of naked bodies goes through the sunscreen faster than you would imagine.

• <u>Board Shorts/Towel</u>: If you borrow someone's board shorts because you forgot your own, that's fine, no problem. Try not to show up time and time again without board shorts or a towel.

- <u>Snacks/drinks</u>: enough said.
- Music: Most boat owners are happy to play your favorite music while you are boarding.

#### Things not to bring

• <u>Junk</u>: A bag or back-pack full of your unnecessary junk. Some guests will pack everything they own related to a day on the lake, just in case....Don't bring more than you will need for a few hours on a boat. Almost nothing!!

• Potential Stains: Soda or anything that stains carpet and vinyl is frowned upon by many boat owners.

• <u>A friend: "Hi guys this is my friend Bud</u>", that is the last thing any boat owner wants to be surprised with. Ask prior to inviting your friend.

#### Things to do

• <u>Be punctual</u>: If you arrive late you are either going to be left behind or joining a boat full of irritated people.

• <u>Help out:</u> Learn the habits of the boat owners. From leaving the slip, to pulling your rider, to returning to the slip and wiping down the boat, you can earn big brownie points for being helpful. Remember who rides at what rope length and change it for them as they prepare for their session. Grab their board for them as they climb back in the boat after a session.

• <u>Clean up:</u> Offer to assist in what ever needs to be done at the end of the day. Help carry equipment back to the truck, wipe the boat down, etc.

• <u>Have fun:</u> Nothing is more pleasing than a guest who has a really good time.

Being a third can be a lot of fun for both the boat owner and the third. The opportunity to be a third more often can be decided based on your actions on and off the boat. You may develop an entirely new group of friends along the way.

The last article I wrote, I was at the West Ramp on a rainy day with the water running in. My Dad would take us mostly surf or trout fishing which I always enjoyed; but in the need of money at age 17, I took a job at Lake Sherwood in the Thousand Oaks area. When I saw the size of the bass that came out of there, I had to get more involved to the tune of 5 bass boats, hundreds of rods and reels, endless tackle, lures, a house on a lake and many of the best memories of my life and friends. I still see one of those friends on a regular basis from Lake Sherwood 37 years ago, and we talk on the phone once a week.

Take it all in, for this may be your last chance To walk along the soft land and see it See the glistening deep lake And the bench that was my grandpa's bench


